
Letter: Two pages – Both sides of page 1, both sides of page 2

Page 1: Lined paper 8-7/8" wide by 6-3/4" high.

Page 2: lined paper 4-1/2" wide by 6-3/4" high.

Page 2 has been ripped into two pieces.

Envelope addressed to Miss Elizabeth Golden, Dennison, Mich.

The front of the envelope was postmarked Conklin, Mich. Nov 6

The back of the envelope was postmarked Dennison, Mich. Nov 7, 1894

The envelope was stamped with a 2-cent stamp.

The envelope is 5-3/4" wide by 3-11/16" high.
